Title: By Understanding the Meaning

of a Passage

Text: John 15:1-17

"If anyone doesn't remain in me, he's like a branch that's thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned." John 15:6

John 15:6 is often misinterpreted to mean, "If you don't bring people to Christ, God is going to throw you away."

The first rule of interpretation ...

1. Consider the historical context.

You ask the question, Who is being spoken to and why are they being told this?

In John 13, 14, 15, and 16 we have one extended conversation that happens on the same night. So to understand chapter 15, and get the historical context you've got to look at the verses/chapters before and after that passage.

These chapters are Jesus' farewell instructions, the most important things he wants us to understand.

A common custom in that day was, after entering a home, servants would wash the feet of guests.

When Jesus washed the disciple's feet He is serving them like the lowliest servant.

"When he finished washing their feet, he put on his clothes and returned to his place. 'Do you understand what I've done for you?' Jesus asked them. 'You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and rightly so, for that's what I am. I am the Lord. I am your teacher. But now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, so also you should wash the feet of one another, one another's feet. I have set the example that you should do as I have done for you." (12-15)

In chapter 13, Jesus emphasizes the importance of loving/serving each other. In chapter 14, Jesus makes four promises.

- 1. I'm going to heaven to prepare a place for you;
- 2. You can talk to me anytime;
- 3. I'm going to put my Holy Spirit in you;
- 4. I'm going to give you the gift of peace.

In chapter 15, Jesus talks about bearing fruit by staying connected.

Then in verse 11 He says, "I've told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete."

That's the context vs 6. Who's he talking to? His Disciples. Why is he saying it? To give them encouragement, that their joy may be full.

Is it likely that in the middle of that Jesus would say, "If you guys don't bear fruit you're going to burn in hell? NO!

The context makes that interpretation nonsense.
